

EVENT OVERVIEW

Decolonized Beatz Indigenous World Pride 2025 (DBIWP) is a global event celebrating the powerful creativity of 2SLGBTQIA+ Indigenous artists, performers, and storytellers. Set to take place on May 30 and June 1, 2025, at The REACH, at The Kennedy Center and The Atlas Performing Arts Center in Piscataway Land ("Washington, D.C."), DBIWP coincides with World Pride and amplifies the voices of Indigenous Queer and Two-Spirit people on a global stage.

OUR PROGRAMMING



Through performances, panel discussions, and film screenings, **DBIWP**challenges colonial narratives and showcases the selfdetermination of Queer and Indigenous communities in sharing
their stories.

The event is rooted in accessibility and inclusion, prioritizing disabled, chronically ill, and multiply marginalized Indigenous attendees.

Having accessibility on the forefront of our programming, the event will be equiped completely to accomodate staff, artists and attendees disability needs.

Its overall purpose is to provide a platform for **2SLGBTQIA+**Indigenous artists and performers from across the globe to share stories, create visibility, celebrate, redefine and create our pride through a variety of artistic mediums.



Four students from the **Indigiqueer Youth Video Production Workshop** will debut their **short films** (5–10 minutes). This initiative supports filmmaking education, offers artistic and networking opportunities, and **provides participants with their first paid videomaking job**.

MUSICAL AND DANCE PERFORMANCES

"Hope", a 100% Indigiqueer music album with seven tracks, will be performed live by Indigenous musicians from all over the world during the event. The album, which celebrates Native creativity and resilience, will debut on May 19, 2025, and DBIWP will bring the musicians together for a first-ever performance at the event.

4 DRAG SHOWS

Experience performances from Indigenous Drag artists such as Lady Shug, a Diné drag performer blending activism and artistry to create social movements, and Ritni Tears, a Sámi storyteller and drag artist.





Creators will be able to showcase and sell their work to a broader audience, helping attract some of the more than two million people expected to attend The Pride in Piscataway Land (Washington, D.C."). The Pop-Up Market will take place throughout the entire event at **The REACH - at Kennedy Center on May 30.**


